He began piano studies in 1930, at the Chicago Conservatory of Music, where he was winner of the Conservatory Medal for Excellence in 1937 and 1938. He joined the Navy in 1943 and was soloist with the U.S. Navy Band in Washington, D.C. in 1945-46.

Resuming his music studies at the conservatory, Mr. Giovannini received his Bachelors degree in piano in 1947 and his Masters degree in composition in 1948.

He joined the National Broadcasting Company, Chicago, as staff pianist in 1949, appearing as soloist on numerous radio and television programs as well as composing and arranging. He left N.B.C. in 1956 to become musical director for the "Kukla, Fran and Ollie" television program, joining the American Broadcasting Company as staff pianist in 1958. He moved to Los Angeles in 1959 where he is currently active as pianist, composer and arranger for various motion picture and television studios, as well as pursuing an active career as composer of concert band music.

THEME FOR A QUIET DAY

The **"Theme For A Quiet Day"** was written on a rainy morning at the composer's home in California.

While intended as a work for two flutes, it can also be performed by any number of flutes in multiples of two.

The work is melodious and colorful; harmonic structures are warm. It's character is that of light, "pop" music. Each part has equal importance, each being a dialogue (conversation) with the other.

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
