The ragtime revival of the 1970's and 1980's focused largely on Scott Joplin and a few other composers of "classic Missouri rags." But there were other regional styles, and other composers of fine ragtime. Some were prolific; others wrote or published just one or two rags.

One of the most prolific was Percy Weinrich. A number of his rags and semi-ragtime popular songs have been rediscovered and re-published in various ragtime collections in the 1970's, '80's and '90's, including Peaches and Cream, Dixie Blossoms, The Smiler, Golden Deer, Silver Bell, and Skeleton Rag.

The name of Albert Gumble is not as widely known, but his The "Bolo" Rag has bee reprinted as well.

"Red Rose Rag" was not their only collaboration. There also exists a rollicking two-step march titled That's The Kind Of Fellow That I Could Love.

"Red Rose Rag" has achieved additional renown in the past two or three decades as a favorite of comedian George Burns, who sang it (if "sang" is the right word) in numerous television appearances, including several times on the "Tonight" show.

The re-published sheet music for "Red Rose Rag is in C Major, and the present arrangement has been transposed down a step to B-Flat Major. Also, because "Red Rose Rag is rather short, the this arrangement presents the entire rag [measures 1 - 53], followed by a reprise of all three strains, but omitting the repeat on the final chorus. To perform the rag in its original form, take the first ending at measure 52, repeat back to measure 37, and then cut from measure 51 to the last measure [measure 101].

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
