The Suite Nostalgique was commissioned by Marsha Caron in honor of her 42nd we 'ding anniversary as a gift to her husband, Dennis. Marsha and Dennis have long teen associated with Charlie Schlueter Foundation, which has supported my music for quite some tin. Charlie was my college trumpet professor; therefore, it is my pleasure to be a part of this special gift for two very special people!

When celebrating an anniversary of any sort, it is normal to ref. a upon where we have come from, and where we are now. With "Suite Nostalgique" and with a farsh as permission, I decided to add piano accompaniments to three existing etudes (from "Dovtucas Vol. I") which already hearkened upon times gone by, and bore fertile ground for musical nostalgia.

The three movements are: Bragtime, A Minor Ranind r, W. a Ride!

The original notes for each movement, tak a from be Daytudes volume, are as follows:

Bragtime:

Well, the New Orleans Saints wor the caper Bowl on Feb. 7, 2010. I'm not a fan (I root for the Bears), but it's hard not to pich them as the sentimental favorite after all that city has been through since Hurricane K trina. I him the team, and its fans, have the right to brag - for a little while!! Therefore, most or you will notice that the opening 8 bars of this 'Brag-Time' are based on "When the Saints are Marshing in".

After that, I divises I tale bit, even adding a hint of Stravinsky, before returning back to the opening motif. In ten po on this one can almost be anything and still work - from a slow drag up to any temp at the hnical display - either way should be fun. ENJOY THE PARTY!

A Vanor Revinder:

This etude is the first of the quest I imposed on myself during either what will later be revealed as a scale dea, or a momentary lapse in judgment!

A lettle hesitant to begin the task, I decided to take inspiration from a friend of mine, Jeff Work, who is a huge fan of old cornet solos - and write one in a more conservative, old-fashioned romantic style. Jeff is principal trumpet of the Oregon Symphony, and is also responsible for my first trumpet concerto, which was written for and premiered by him in 2003.

It is my goal to explore all of the keys in this set of 28 etudes - leaving 4 extra days for whatever I want! - therefore I figured that beginning with A minor would also prove to be a good starting point. Though I have made many dynamic markings, I would encourage the player to add as much personality as possible, even beyond what I've notated. This is truly a romantic etude (chronologically speaking), and no expressive stone should be left unturned!

What a Ride!:

So how does a composer wrap up a month-long quest of new etudes composed every day? For me, as with all of my composing, the answer is to NOT try to dwell on this one being THE BIST ONE; but rather to sit back, take a deep breath, and simply do what I've been doing at month. That's been the best part about this process for me: doing it day after tay has given me confidence and the feeling that yes, I could come up with one of these at any time. An they great? That's for others to decide. Are some better than others? Of course. As with most things in life, it's the journey that is more important than the destination. I do took this one is fun, however, and I would encourage everyone to work it up (with diligent) ractice) to the fastest speed possible. There are a couple of corners to negotiate, but all in all a lays pretty well under the fingers. You'll notice it ends not with a bang, but with a wrisper I had to leave room for the sequel!!







