NOTE TO PERFORMER

This solo was composed to demonstrate not only the accepted bravura style of trombone performance, but also to highlight the charm of legato playing and to demonstrate the possibility of fast technique when slide positions and lip turns are carefully plotted.

The fact that the work is unaccompanied gives the soloist generous freedom for dramatic and exciting use of range and volume extremes.

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ABOUT THE COMPOSER

Paul Tanner was raised in Wilmington, Delaware where he studied trombone with teachers from the Curtis Institute of Music. He studied composition and orchestration in New York and California as a student of Dr. Roy Harris and Stephen Volpe, receiving his B.A., M.A. and PhD. from U.C.L.A.

In 1951 he settled in California as first trombonist for the American Broadcasting Company, holding that position for 16 years.

In addition to his recording activities for Motion Pictures and Television, Tanner is a member of the Academic Faculties of U.C.L.A. and is in much demand as a concert artist.

His compositions include many published works for solo trombone and trombone choirs; he also is the author of several instruction books.
