PROGRAM NOTES

In 2009, we celebrate Felix Mendelssohn's 200th birthday. He is considered by many to be the 19th century equivalent to W.A. Mozart. By the age of 12 he had completed a set of 12 string symphonies. He was extraordinarily gifted and excelled in writing just about any type of music. His "Songs Without Words" are beloved by pianists and audience alike. This one, *Opus 102, No. 6*, was his very last.

NOTES TO THE CONDUCTOR

This is a work to really stretch the emotional range of your orchestra's playing and their ability to follow you (bonus!). This music is hymn-like and is often subtitled "Faith" or "Belief." Therefore, it is best played as if sung, with room to breathe between phrases. Really encourage the violas and cellos as they get their moment from bars 15–19, and also let the violas know how interesting their parts are: sometimes they play with the 2nd violins, sometimes with the cellos, sometimes alone.

Ihope you and your students enjoy this work, and celebrate 200 years of Mendelssohn!
