THE ARRANGER

Erik Morales is an American composer, conductor, and trumpeter. He has composed best-selling music for many genres including classical, jazz, and commercial. He has over one hundred and fifty publications that encompass a large variety of styles and settings, including works for wind, orchestral, jazz, and chamber ensembles that have been part of featured performances across the globe. He studied composition at Florida International University and completed his bachelor's degree at the University of Louisiana, Lafayette in 1989.

Mr. Morales is an outspoken advocate of music education in our schools and community. In 2016 he was inducted into the Louisiana Association for Jazz

Education's Hall of Fame and was presented a lifetime achievement award for dedication, support, advancement and continuance of jazz education in the state of Louisiana. In 2020 he was appointed musical director of the newly-formed Covington Concert Band. He was instrumental in forming the Northshore Music Alliance, a non-profit organization where he currently serves as president. In 2022, Mr. Morales was awarded Best Musical Artist at the 16th annual Parish President's Arts Awards for Saint Tammany Parish, Louisiana. He is currently a member of the American Society of Composers, Authors, and Publishers (ASCAP), Jazz Education Network (JEN) and the International Trumpet Guild (ITG).

ABOUT THE MUSIC

New York, New York is one of the most iconic crooner songs of all time. The tune was composed for the 1977 Martin Scorsese film of the same name. Notable performances and recordings were made by singers Liza Minnelli and Frank Sinatra. This arrangement is influenced by the popular version performed by Frank Sinatra. All eighth notes are treated as "swing" throughout the arrangement. Articulations such as staccato and legato should be played as marked.
